### AN IN-DEPTH INSIGHT INTO THE FACULTY OF PHILOSOPHY UNIVERSITAS GADJAH MADA

### A. BRIEF HISTORY

The Faculty of Philosophy of Universitas Gadjah Mada was established on August 18, 1967, with the Decree of the Director General of Higher Education Number 90/1967 of August 7, 1967, and subsequently commencing student admissions and academic activities in 1968. The establishment of the Faculty of Philosophy was sparked mainly because of the increasingly urgent needs in the field of fostering education in general, and science in particular. A specific emphasis was placed on basic science and general knowledge (*studium generale*). It is possible to be conducted because Philosophy has a central position in science. The Faculty of Philosophy is expected to produce well-rounded and knowledgeable scholars. These scholars are not only equipped with critical logical, and integrative thinking but also the capacity to integrate and apply their respective expertise in the unity of life, within the dynamic context of Indonesian society. Philosophy transcends the confines of personal growth and mental development and serves as a means in the cultivation and enrichment of Indonesian cultures.

Prior to the establishment of the independent Faculty of Philosophy independently, Universitas Gadjah Mada already had Faculties of Literature, Pedagogics, and Philosophy. Government Regulation Number 37 of 1950, Article 5, Paragraph (1), Letter (d), of August 14, 1950, specified that the Faculty of Literature, Pedagogics, and Philosophy UGM comprised three departments: Literature, Pedagogics, and Philosophy, abbreviated as SPF. This Faculty was officially inaugurated on January 23, 1951, under the leadership of Prof. Drs. Abdullah Sigit as its chairman. Subsequently, by virtue of the Decree of the Minister of Education, Teaching, and Culture No. 5375, on September 15, 1955, a unified Faculty of General Studies and Philosophy was established. This decision was underpinned by the intent to uphold and organize educational and pedagogical interests, emphasizing foundational and general knowledge (studium generale). The amalgamation of these two faculties was made with careful consideration of the pivotal role of the Faculty of Philosophy within Universitas Gadjah Mada and the central importance of philosophy in science.

The organizational structure of the Joint Faculty of General Studies and Philosophy during the period 1958-1962 was as follows: Prof. Drs. Notonagoro, S.H., served as the Dean, and Drs. Koento Wibisono held the position of Secretary. In 1961, with the issuance of the Decree of the Minister of PTIP Number 32/1961, of August 8, 1961, the Faculty of Philosophy was abolished. Another decree, the Decree of the Minister of PTIP Number 144/1962, dated November 27, 1962, similarly declared the dissolution of the General Faculty. Subsequently, under the authority of UGM Rector Decree No. 1/1963 of January 25, 1963, the Bureau for the Implementation of Special Courses at UGM (abbreviated as BPKKC) was established. Its mandate encompassed the responsibilities originally overseen by the unified General Faculty and Faculty of Philosophy, which had been disbanded. BPKKC was tasked with the organization and conduct of lectures in the fields of Philosophy, State Ideology, Religious Education, and Studium Generale at Universitas Gadjah Mada, a role it commenced in 1962. The Faculty of Philosophy at UGM was reinstated through the Decree of the Director General of Higher Education on August 7, 1967, numbered 90/1967. Subsequently, with the Decree of the Rector of UGM on September 23, 1969, numbered 44/1969, BPKKC was integrated into the Faculty of Philosophy, a transition that came into effect in January 1969.

### B. FOUNDATION, VISION, MISSION AND OBJECTIVES

The foundation of the establishment of the Faculty of Philosophy UGM

# The Faculty of Philosophy, Universitas Gadjah Mada is grounded in the following foundational principles:

- a. To embody the objectives/responsibilities of education, in a general and within higher education to be more specific, as delineated in Article 31 of the 1945 Constitution, MPRS Decree No. XXVII/MPRS/1966, Articles 3 and 4 of Law No. 4/1950, Article 2 of Law No. 22/1961, and Articles 3 and 9 of Government Regulation No. 7/1950. The objective of these foundational elements is the cultivation of morally upright scholars, scientific experts, and adept and cultured members of society having the spirit of *Pancasila*.
- b. To accomplish the objectives/responsibilities as articulated in Article 1 of Decree of the Presidium of Universitas Gadjah Mada Number 8/1968, which primarily pertains to the provision of education in the field of philosophy expertise.

### Vision of the Faculty of Philosophy

To be a renowned academic program dedicated to the study and advancement of Philosophy as well as fostering the values of local wisdom deeply rooted in the principles of Pancasila.

### Missions of the Faculty of Philosophy

- a) Enhancing the quality of philosophy education and local wisdom to cultivate high quality scholars with the ethos of Pancasila;
- b) Elevating the standards of research in philosophy and local wisdom, thereby supporting the commitment to education and community outreach;
- c) Elevating the quality of community engagement, particularly in philosophy and local wisdom;
- d) Improving the quality of institutional, human resource, and financial management to ensure support for education, research, development, and community service in the domains of philosophy and local wisdom;
- e) Fortifying collaborative relationships with various stakeholders in education, research, development, and community service within the domain of philosophy and local wisdom.

### **Objectives of the Study Program**

The Undergraduate Program of the Faculty of Philosophy Universitas Gadjah Mada as the educational institution has established following objectives.

### a) General Objective


To produce scholars equipped with the competence to engage in philosophical thinking, while developing practical skills, managerial prowess, and critical attitudes. These attributes encompass radical, fundamental, logical, systematic, comprehensive, and responsible wisdom in their thought processes.

### b) Specific Objectives

- i. To produce graduates with good expertise in philosophy.
- ii. To produce graduates with a profound understanding of local wisdom and Pancasila.
- iii. To produce graduates characterized by critical thinking, innovation, moral integrity, and the capacity to conceptually formulate and proffer solutions to life's intricate challenges.

### D. FACILITIES

Philosophy Study Program provides a comprehensive range of infrastructure and facilities, complemented by abundant financial resources. These provisions have significantly contributed to fostering academic interactions among the academic community, comprising lecturers, students, and educational staffs in the Philosophy Study Program. All infrastructure, facilities, and financial resources are the assets of the Faculty of Philosophy and are made readily accessible to the Philosophy Study Program. A detailed explanation of the specific infrastructure, facilities, and funds is explained as follows:

- 1) Building A or the five-story Notonagoro Building, with each floor named after a core value of Pancasila:
  - a) The First Floor, *Keadilan (Justice)*, consisting of; Academic Services Room for Undergraduate Program, Academic Services for Master and Doctoral Programs, Warehouse, Equipment Storage, Finance Section Head Office, Finance and General Affairs Office, Personnel Office, Office of the Head, Control Room.
  - b) The Second Floor, *Kerakyatan (Democracy)*, consisting of; Library Reading Room, Library, Collection Book Management, Audio Visual Room, Philosophy Laboratory
    - Nusantara, Quality Assurance, Dean's Secretariat, Dean's Conference Room.
  - c) The Third Floor, *Persatuan (Unity)* consisting of; Meeting Room *Persatuan*, Lecturer Services Secretariat.
  - d) The Fourth Floor, *Kemanusiaan (Humanity)* including; Postgraduate Lecture Hall, and General Lecture Hall.
  - e) The Fifth Floor, *Ketuhanan (Divinity)*, including; Quality Assurance Archive Room, Conference Room, Post-graduate Program Thesis Seminar Room, Post-graduate Program Independent Study Room.
- 2) Infrastructure of the three-story Building B.
  - a) The 1st floor includes; Gamelan Room, Housekeeping
  - b) The 2nd floor includes; IT Room, Transit Room and Quality Assurance Unit, Lecture Rooms
  - c) The 2nd floor includes; Lecture Rooms, Thesis Exam Rooms

- 3) Infrastructure of the three-story Building C.
  - a) The first floor includes; Archive Room, KPI Courtroom, Stationery Warehouse Room, Photocopy Room, Dharma Wanita Room, KPI Room, MPK Administration Room, Lecturer Lounge.
  - b) The 2nd floor includes; Lecture Rooms
  - c) The 3rd Floor: Lecture Rooms, Auditorium.
- 4) Student Activity Facilities; The Philosophy Student Press Bureau (BPMF) "Pijar", Muslim Family Philosophy Student Group (KMF), Christian Philosophy Student Group (CHRISPHY), Philosophy Study Circle Student Group (LSF) "Co-gito", Music Community Student Group "Sande Monink", Student Institute (LM), Lovers of the Universe Student Group "Panta-Rhei", Re-Torika Student Group (Arts and Culture Forum), "Colosseum" Student Group".
- 5) Library with extensive collections, including textbooks, nationally and internationally accredited journals, conference proceedings, theses, and dissertations.

All lecture rooms mentioned above are equipped with air conditioning and internet connectivity. In addition, the library rooms are equipped with hotspot facilities, facilitating direct internet access for students and lecturers within the study program. The LAFINUS, which holds a substantial collection of books, research reports, and journals on Nusantara Philosophy, serves as a valuable resource for students and lecturers engaged in assessments and research tasks related to local wisdom values.

Similarly, a substantial financial allocation has been provided to support the execution of Tridharma activities within the Philosophy Study Program. Under the faculty's leadership policy, a budgetary framework has been established, ensuring the realization of activities within each functional unit. The Philosophy Study Program's routine financial resources are derived from the following sources:

- 1) Government funds allocated through DIPA (Budget Implementation Statement);
- 2) Competitive research and community service grants from the Directorate General of Higher Education, Ministry of Research, Technology, and Higher Education of the Republic of Indonesia;

- 3) Funding for research and community service initiatives, journal publication, and independent book publishing;
- 4) Financial contributions from the community, including Single Tuition Fees (UKT) and sponsorships;
- 5) Funding acquired through collaborations with government and private entities, such as the Kertagama Foundation in Jakarta.

### **EDUCATION PROCESS**

### A. Education Programs

The Faculty of Philosophy administers an undergraduate education program (S1). According to the accreditation granted by BAN-PT on April 7, 2020, the Philosophy Study Program has attained Accreditation A, documented as Decree Number 2268/SK/BAN-PT/Ak-PPJ/S/IV/2020. Admission to the undergraduate program is facilitated through SNMPTN, SBMPTN, and UM-UGM selection mechanisms. Each enrolled student is required to complete a minimum of 144 credits. Since the Academic Year 1992/1993, the Faculty of Philosophy has also introduced a Master Program (S-2) that holds an A-accredited Master's degree (SK. Number: 2273/SK/BAN-PT/Ak-PPJ/M/IV/2020). Furthermore, since the Academic Year 1997/1998, a Doctoral Program (S-3) with A-accreditation (SK Number: 2284/SK/BAN-PT/Ak-PPJ/D/IV/2020) has been established within the Faculty of Philosophy. In addition to these academic programs, the Faculty of Philosophy offers personality development courses (MPK) that are open to students from all faculties at UGM.

The Undergraduate Program (S1) offered by the Faculty of Philosophy is composed of a Philosophy Study Program, organized into three departments: the Department of Western Philosophy, the Department of Eastern Philosophy, and the Department of Religion. Within these departments, there are four study interest areas: a. Ethics; b. The Philosophy of Science and Technology; c. The Philosophy of Religion and Culture; d. The Philosophy of Social and Politics.

### **B.** Learning Systems

The Faculty of Philosophy implements a semester system, characterized by a 16-18 week of lectures, which incorporates 2 weeks dedicated to learning evaluation. This approach encompasses the planning, preparation, and implementation of educational programs. It employs the semester credit system as a metric for measuring the educational workload, particularly with regard to student study responsibilities. Some crucial aspects concerning the implementation of education within this credit system are elaborated in the following section of this handbook.

### **Definition and Purposes of Credit Semester**

Within the credit system, the study load assigned to students at a specific academic level is quantified in terms of credit units. Recognizing the diverse interests, talents, and capabilities of individual students, the method and timeframe for completing this study load, as well as the composition of study activities required to meet these obligations, may vary among students within the same cohort.

The Purposes of Credit Semester are:

- a. Giving students the chance to engage in educational activities aligned with their interests, talents, and abilities.
- b. Creating opportunities for capable and motivated students to improve their academic progress and complete their studies more efficiently.
- c. Facilitating curriculum adjustments in response to advancements in science and technology.
- d. Enhancing the system for evaluating student skills.

### Semester Credit Unit

Education which involves the workload of both students and lecturers needs a quantifiable assessment is imperative, and it is defined in terms of credit units. Universitas Gadjah Mada, follows the semester system, known as "Semester Credit Unit," abbreviated as SKS. These credits are allocated to various educational activities, including lectures, laboratory sessions, fieldwork, seminars, capita selecta, and research. The allocation of credits to each educational activity depends on the amount of time dedicated to that specific activity.

a. Credit allocation for lectures, one credit corresponds to an educational activity of 3 hours per week. In a semester, which spans 16 weeks, one credit is equivalent to 48 hours of educational engagement. For students, these 3 weekly hours of educational commitment comprise: 1 hour of in-person lecture sessions scheduled with the lecturer; an additional 1 hour for supplementary educational tasks planned by the lecturer but not designated within the schedule, such as homework or essay assignments; and 1 hour for independent student activities.

- b. For lecturers, the credit semester of 3 hours encompasses: 1 hour for delivering scheduled lectures, involving face-to-face interactions with students; 1 hour for the planning of development.
- c. The credits allocated for field includes laboratory practice, with an estimated commitment of 4-5 hours per week, totalling 64-80 hours over one semester for 1 credit.
- d. When field practice extends over an established duration, the credit calculation needs an assessment of the daily hours invested by students and the proportion of the total educational load at the corresponding level.
- e. Credits designated for seminars and capita selecta are the same as those allocated for lectures. These activities include a range of formats, including seminars, lectures, presentations, or assignments given by instructors to students.
- f. The credit for research conducted to write a thesis is similar to the calculation method for physical and activities in one semester. Research undertaken by students to complete a bachelor's thesis may be assessed at 3-6 credits, including the thesis writing process.

### C. Study Plan

The Study Plan and study activities for a semester may vary from one student to another. When designing a Study Plan for a semester, students should carefully assess their individual capabilities. For new students in their first semester, the Study Plan is offered through a package system, amounting to 22 credits. In subsequent semesters, the Study Plan depends on the student's academic performance in the previous semester, which is indicated by the achievement index. Further details regarding the definition of achievement index can be found in the section concerning the learning evaluation and study duration.

Student academic achievements are documented in the format of the Study Result Card (KHS). The KHS primarily serves as a tool for determining the number of credits that can be chosen in the upcoming semester, factoring in the student's performance in preceding semesters. The allotment of credits available for the following semester is as follows:

The formulation of a study plan for a semester is determined by two main factors: the average daily workload and individual aptitude. Typically, individuals have a daily workload of approximately 6-8 hours. However, students are expected to invest more hours than the average worker. If a student generally allocates approximately 6-8 hours during the day and an additional 2 hours in the evening for academic pursuits, this student needs to commit to a total of 8-10 hours of study per day, equal to 48-60 hours weekly. As per regulations, 1 credit corresponds to either 3 sessions of 50-minute lecture activities or 4-5 hours of physical and psychomotor activities. Consequently, the Study Plans that a student can take comprises 16-24 credits, with an average of 20 credits if this student only takes lectures. This credit could be lower if laboratory or field practices are incorporated in addition to lectures.

Every student is assigned an Academic Advisor (DPA). The Academic Advisor is responsible for providing assistance with academic challenges that students encounter during their education, fosters effective learning habits and strategies, and assists in the formulation of Study Plan. In addition, the Academic Advisor gives the approval of the student's Study Plan, which will be uploaded on the *simaster* platform.

The Study Plan contains comprehensive information about the courses selected such as the sequence number, course code, course title, credit, as well as the room and time for each course. Students are obligated to complete the Study Plan for the current semester based on their earned results/grades, in accordance with established regulations. Those seeking to initiate or modify their Study Plan are granted the opportunity during specified timeframes. Any alterations or cancellations to the Study Plan need authorization and approval from the Academic Advisor (DPA).

### **D. LECTURES**

Lectures are conducted using various methods, such as traditional lectures, discussions, receptions, seminars, class presentations, reading courses, and other methods suitable for the subjects. The organization of lectures adheres to the Faculty's academic calendar.

Following are the lectures and examination guidelines:

- a. Students are expected to attend, participate in lectures based on the schedule and sign the attendance list. If students are unable to attend lectures, they must provide a letter of permission, supported by a doctor's certificate (in the case of illness) or another certificate issued by the Academic Department, no later than 1 week after the date of absence.
- b. Students should utilize educational resources and facilities following the established regulations or as specified by the lecturer.
- c. Students accomplish the assignments and responsibilities assigned by the lecturer, which serve as the inseparable elements in the teaching and learning experience.
- d. To be eligible for the final semester examination, students must have attended a minimum of 75% (seventy-five percent) of the lectures for the enrolled courses. No supplementary exams or alternative assignments are provided.
- e. Students who have made alteration to their Study Plan should be aware that absences from originally enrolled courses cannot be considered as attending those courses.
- f. The subjects having been learned in a course may be subject to examination if a minimum of 14 (fourteen) sessions have been conducted in one semester.
- g. There are no provisions for makeup exams except in cases of force majeure or illness. Under those circumstances, students must promptly report their condition and submit a certificate (a doctor's certificate in the case of illness) to the Academic and Student Affairs Division of the Faculty of Philosophy, UGM, within one week after the scheduled examination date.
- h. The scheduling of makeup exams is a collaborative effort between the course instructor and the Academic Division.
- i. Students are strictly prohibited for smoking during lectures and examinations.
- j. The use of drugs (NAPZA) and alcohol within the campus environment is prohibited.

- k. Students must be neatly dressed, appropriately attired, and polite. Moreover, students must not wear T-shirts, flip-flops, or pants with knee holes.
- 1. Any additional matters not covered within this Code of Conduct Regulation will be addressed in subsequent regulations.

### E. EVALUATION

### **Course Evaluation**

Examinations are conducted using various forms, such as written exams, oral exams, seminars, essay-based assessments, and more. It is also possible to integrate various combinations of these methods, with the choice of examination method aligning with the nature of the educational activities.

Examinations serve specific objectives as explained below:

- a. To measure students' comprehension of the material.
- b. To assess students' proficiency in line with the learning outcomes established for each course.

There are two types of examinations:

- 1. Course Examinations: These assessments cover subjects in accordance with the curriculum at the relevant academic level. Course examinations, conducted at the end of each semester, cover material presented in the respective semester.
- 2. Thesis Examination: This examination evaluates the outcomes of students' final projects once they have successfully completed all required courses. The board of examination consists of examiners appointed by the team.

### **Assessment System**

The assessment system relies on the Semester Learning Plan (SSP) provided by the lectures in the beginning of the course. This framework is outcome-based, measuring the attainment of learning objectives. Students demonstrating exceptional performance receive an A grade; those with commendable performance earn a B; students with moderate proficiency get a C, while a D grade is assigned to students with less satisfactory performance. Students who do not meet the minimum requirements receive a failing grade of E. lecturers are allowed to give grades using the following categories:

### **Retaking a Course**

To improve their grades, students may retake courses that they have previously completed within the designated study time limit. The grade used to calculate the Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) is the highest grade obtained. Courses that are mandatory and have received an E grade must be retaken in a subsequent semester.

### **Study Evaluation**

Students' academic progress will be evaluated at the conclusion of the first two years and at the culmination of their academic program. Furthermore, an evaluation must also be conducted when reaching the deadline for program completion.

Assessment of student academic performance involves converting letter grades into numerical weighted values, as outlined in the provided list. Using these weighted values, the Grade Point Average (GPA) is calculated using the following formula:

The sum of credits multiplied by

The Weight Values for each course

= GPA

The total number of credits hours

This can also be measured by using following formula

The credit of each course taken

X the weight values

GPA = 

The total number of credit hours

### 1. Evaluation of Learning Outcomes in the First Two Years (4 semesters)

Upon the completion of the first two years after the initial registration, an evaluation of the student's academic performance is conducted to determine whether these students may continue their studies or are required to discontinue their study.

Students are eligible to continue their studies if they meet the following criteria:

- a. Having completed a minimum of 30 credits.
- b. Attaining a grade point average (GPA) of at least 2.00.
- c. Having no any failing grades (E).
- d. Maintaining continuous registration as a student at the Faculty of Philosophy, UGM for four consecutive semesters (without taking leave).

If a student accumulates more than 30 credits within two years, only the 30 credits corresponding to the educational activities with the highest grades are considered for evaluation. It is important to note that D grades may still be included in the GPA calculation.

### 2. Evaluation of Final Learning Outcomes for Undergraduate Program

The maximum duration for completing undergraduate studies is 14 semesters (7 years). To successfully complete the undergraduate program at the Faculty of Philosophy, students are required to accumulate a minimum of 144 credits. Those who have achieved this credit requirement, following the 2020 curriculum, are considered to have completed their undergraduate studies if they meet the following conditions:

- a. Attaining a cumulative grade point average (GPA) of at least 2.50.
- b. Having no any failing grades (E).
- c. Having D grades not more than 25% of the total credits earned.
- d. Successfully completing the thesis writing and thesis examination.

Students receive the following graduation designations in the *judicium* meeting:

GPA 3,51 – 4,00	= Cum Laude (With Praise)*
GPA 3,01 – 3,50	= Very Satisfactory
GPA 2,76 – 3,00	= Satisfactory
GPA < 2,76	= No Predicate

<sup>\*</sup> Note: The Cum Laude is applicable for students who complete their studies within a maximum period of 5 years (10 semesters).

### 3. The Limit of Study Duration

Undergraduate Program should be completed within a minimum of 8 (eight) semesters and a maximum of 14 (fourteen) semesters, as outlined in Rector's Decree Number 279/P/SK/HT/2009. Periods of inactive study with authorized leave are not counted while periods of inactivity without formal authorization are taken into account. Upon reaching the study duration limit, an evaluation of the student's academic progress is conducted. If the students do not meet established requirements for completing the undergraduate level, they are required to discontinue their study.

Students seeking temporary suspension of their studies due to unavoidable circumstances must obtain written permission from the Dean (for leave periods of up to two years, either consecutively or intermittently) or from the Chancellor (for leave periods exceeding two years). Leave requests should be submitted no later than one month before the registration period for the relevant semester ends. Students are allowed to apply for leave only after successfully passing the initial two-year evaluation.

Students who do not re-register or take approved leave have their student status revoked for the respective semester, and they are not allowed to participate in academic activities or utilize available facilities. To reactivate their status, these students, students must submit a reactivation application.

Students who do not take official academic leave or attend classes without permission or notification will be required to settle the tuition fees for the previous semester upon reactivation.

### F. THESIS WRITING

### **Requirements for Submitting a Thesis Proposal:**

- a. Students have completed a minimum of 94 credits.
- b. Students attain a minimum grade of C in Philosophy Research Methodology, Scientific Article Writing Technique, Religious Education, Pancasila Education, Citizenship Education, and Indonesian Language courses.
- c. Students attain at least a B grade in courses relevant to the thesis proposal's theme.
- d. Students have completed a minimum of 12 credits in study focus courses related to the chosen study interest.
- e. Students have a cumulative GPA of at least 2.00.

- f. Students provide evidence of attending the thesis proposal seminar on at least 5 occasions (the necessary forms can be obtained from the Academic and Student Affairs Section or downloaded from www.filsafat.ugm.ac.id
- g. The thesis proposal seminar is attended by a minimum of 5 students, including the Main Supervisor and the Co-Supervisor.
- h. The thesis proposals have obtained approval from both the Main Supervisor and Co-Supervisor.

### Thesis Examination Procedures and Assessment

- a) Students must fulfill all their obligations (financial responsibilities, the study plan, thesis guidance, and submission of transcripts).
- b) Students should have successfully completed all courses, accumulating at least 138 credits, maintaining a cumulative GPA of at least 2.50 without any E grades. Further, the student must have D grades which should not exceed 25% of the total credits and receive a minimum grade of B in the thesis proposal seminar.
- c) The thesis examination can be conducted after the approval from both the Main Supervisor and Co-Supervisor. The examination date should be set no earlier than 14 days after submitting the thesis file to the Academic Section.
- d) The board of thesis examination consists of 4 lecturers, including the Main Supervisor, Co-Supervisor, and 2 other examiners.
- e) If one of the examiners is unable to attend or experiences an unforeseen circumstance during the thesis examination, the examination can proceed with a minimum of 3 examiners, including the Main Supervisor and Co-Supervisor.
- f) Examiners who arrive more than 30 minutes late without prior notice are not eligible to participate in the examination or assign grades. However, the examination can proceed if the Main Supervisor, Co-Supervisor, and one of the other examiners are present.
- g) The thesis examination will be canceled under the following conditions: students arrive more than 30 minutes late without prior notice; students have not fulfilled financial obligations; students cannot show their Student Identity Card or Study Plan; the Main Supervisor or Co-Supervisor is absent; or two other examiners are absent. Upon these circumstances, the examination can be rescheduled on a mutually agreed-upon date between the examiner and the student.

h) Students will pass the thesis examination if each examiner gives a minimum grade of C. The final examination grade is determined based on the average grades.

### G. Academic Code of Conduct

The Student Code of Conduct, referring to the Rector's Decree Number 711/P/SK/HT/2013, includes:

- a. Students as individuals.
- b. Students as campus members.
- c. Students as community members.
- d. Students as citizens.

### The Student Code of Conduct as Individuals

### **Every student must:**

- a. Have faith and devotion to God Almighty;
- b. Enhance religious devotion according to the teachings of one's faith, while respecting inter-religious tolerance;
- c. Uphold self-dignity;
- d. Maintain and improve physical and mental health;
- e. Enhance self-actualization in both academic and non-academic endeavors, as well as in daily life;
- f. Show politeness and humility in daily conduct;
- g. Maintain personal hygiene and courteous act;
- h. Show respect and obedience to parents/guardians, as long as it aligns with religious principles and legal regulations;
- i. Preserve the integrity, harmony, and well-being of the family;
- j. Uphold responsibility for the family's reputation in the community;
- k. Live a simple life.

### The Student Code of Conduct as Campus Member

### **Every student must:**

- a. Embody the values of Universitas Gadjah Mada;
- b. Understand and uphold the University's vision, mission, and goals;

- c. Preserve the University's reputation and honor by adhering to all its regulations and decisions;
- d. Uphold principles of academic honesty;
- e. Show academic responsibilities with diligence;
- f. Carry out assigned tasks from the University conscientiously;
- g. Demonstrate respect for lecturers, educational staff, and fellow students;
- h. Maintain professional relationships with lecturers, educational staff, and fellow students;
- i. Nurture and sustain unity within the academic community;
- j. Respect diverse perspectives and prioritizing constructive dialogue;
- k. Uphold academic freedom and promote the advancement of knowledge, technology, arts, and culture;
- 1. Show respect for the discoveries or creative works of others.

### **Every student must not:**

- a. Commit plagiarism, including but not limited to:
  - Quoting concepts, ideas, paraphrases, images, tables, graphs, and/or data without citing the source;
  - 2) Submitting and/or publishing academic work that is partially or entirely identical to work previously done by others;
  - 3) Claiming someone else's work as one's own;
  - 4) Providing one's work to others to submit as their own academic assignment and/or for publication;
  - 5) Submitting the same academic work for different courses (self-plagiarism or autoplagiarism).
- b. Commit Academic Fraud, including but not limited to:
  - 1) Becoming a student through improper or dishonest ways;
  - 2) Opening, reading, and/or quoting books, other documents, and/or electronic media during closed-book examinations:
  - 3) Collaborating with other participants during examinations;
  - 4) Falsifying and manipulating data;
  - 5) Forging signatures on documents;

- 6) Completing assignments or substituting for someone else in examinations, practical work, and/or other academic activities;
- c. Express opinions, engaging in actions, and/or failing to prevent actions that may disrupt the peace of the university;
- d. Engage in or failing to prevent actions, whether directly or indirectly, that may tarnish the reputation, dignity, and prestige of the University;
- e. Engage in actions that may impact the teaching and learning process as well as the assessment of academic performance by lecturers;
- f. Represent the University without the approval of the University authorities;
- g. Use academic titles to which one is not entitled;
- h. Damage the University's environmental facilities;
- i. Disrupt the security, safety, and overall comfort of the University environment;
- j. Litter in the University environment;
- k. Violate lecture regulations and learning agreements;
- 1. Commit a criminal offense;
- m. Engage in immoral conduct;
- n. Be involved in the distribution, use, and/or trafficking of narcotics, psychotropic substances, and other controlled substances (NAPZA), and/or;
- o. Be enrolled as a student in two or more study programs at Universitas Gadjah Mada during the same study period.

### **Every student is entitled to:**

- a. Receive academic services in accordance with applicable laws, regulations, and University rules or decisions;
- b. Get a sense of security and safety while participating in activities at the University and/or related to University responsibilities, both academic and non-academic, in compliance with laws, regulations, and/or University rules or decisions;
- c. Access healthcare insurance as per the requirements of applicable laws, regulations, and University rules or decisions;
- d. Have opportunities to enhance academic, non-academic skills, and/or engage in various student activities, in line with the provisions of applicable laws, regulations, and/or University rules or decisions;
- e. Utilize University facilities with a sense of responsibility;

- f. Express aspirations and academic freedom in a courteous, constructive, and responsible manner; and/or;
- g. Obtain and utilize a degree that corresponds to their level of education upon graduation, following University regulations and decisions.

### The Student Code of Conduct as Community Member

### **Every student must:**

- a. Set a positive example for the community, both in religious and social aspects of life;
- b. Shows politeness, courtesy, and/or respect for others, regardless of their religion, gender, ethnicity, race, and/or social class in social interactions;
- c. Show respect for different opinions;
- d. Prioritize discussion and consensus-building when addressing community issues; and/or;
- e. Maintain harmonious interactions with the social and natural environment;
- f. Respect different religions, beliefs, cultures, and/or customs; and/or;
- g. Contribute to the maintenance of order, security, and the overall well-being of social life.

Students are prohibited from engaging in anarchist and/or provocative actions that may disrupt the security and/or harmony of society.

In cases of disrespectful and/or undignified treatment from the community, students are entitled to protection from the University.

### The Student Code of Conduct as Citizens

### **Every student must:**

- a. Practice Pancasila and the 1945 Constitution of the Republic of Indonesia consistently and wholeheartedly;
- b. Show respect for the symbols and emblems of the Unitary State of the Republic of Indonesia;
- c. Foster and preserve the unity of the Indonesian Nation;
- d. Promote the Indonesian identity by using proper and correct Indonesian language;
- e. Uphold and preserve the national culture;
- f. Prioritize the interests of the nation and the state over personal and/or group interests;
- g. Uphold the honor and dignity of the nation and the state;
- h. Participate in efforts related to the defense, security, and/or protection of the state;
- i. Adhere to and/or comply with all laws and regulations;

- j. Actively contribute to the success of national development; and/or
- k. Properly maintain and use public facilities wisely.

Students are prohibited from adhering to and/or promoting atheism or religions, beliefs, or teachings that are prohibited by the Republic of Indonesia.

### Every student is entitled to:

- a. Access to education and instruction;
- b. The right to assemble, associate, and express thoughts verbally and in writing in accordance with applicable regulations;
- c. A sense of security; and
- d. Responsible and sustainable use of natural resources.

Violations of the aforementioned Code of Conduct will result in sanctions determined by the ethics committee, with the following objectives:

- a. Enforcing discipline and compliance to achieve the educational objectives;
- b. Preserving the quality of education and motivating students to reach their full potential, thus maintaining a balance between input and output.

### H. ACADEMIC SANCTIONS

Academic sanctions refer to penalties that may be imposed on students who violate regulations during their study at the Faculty of Philosophy, Universitas Gadjah Mada.

Sanctions imposed on students has the following objectives:

- a. Enforcing discipline and compliance to achieve the educational objectives.
- b. Preserving the quality of education and motivating students to reach their full potential, thus maintaining a balance between input and output.

### **Types of Sanctions**

Based on the nature of learning activities, the sanctions that can be imposed on students fall into two categories:

### a. Administrative Sanction

It emphasizes compliance with administrative processes. Sanctions are necessary when students fail to adhere to these processes or display negligence.

### b. Academic Sanction

It prioritizes the maintenance of academic quality, and students with inconsistent learning performance may be subject to sanctions. Quality control is maintained through early and advanced-stage evaluations aimed at providing coaching.

The application of these sanctions must be suitable to the quantity and quality of violations during the learning process at the Faculty of Philosophy, Universitas Gadjah Mada.

### **Scope of Sanctions**

- a. Administrative sanctions apply to violations such as late registration, exam registration, incomplete Study Plan submissions, and others.
- b. Academic sanctions apply to violations including exceeding study load, unauthorized changes to the Study Plan without academic supervisor permission, forgery of academic supervisor signatures, lecture attendance requirements neglect, cheating in examinations, grade falsification, plagiarism, exceeding study duration, and more.

### **Forms of Sanctions**

### a. Administration Sanctions

- 1) Penalties for unauthorized leaves entail paying Single Tuition Fees for the period of unauthorized inactivity.
- 2) Students on academic leave for five or more semesters are subject to fines and are required to pay Single Tuition Fees for the semesters not attended during their leave.
- 3) Students who postpone their graduation face sanctions and must provide a notarized statement letter while continuing to pay Single Tuition Fees during the extended period.
- 4) Students who extend their studies without completing them within the extension period must provide a notarized statement and a letter of recommendation from their academic supervisor and/or thesis advisor. They are also required to submit a report on their academic progress.

### b. Academic Sanctions

- 1) Students who delay completing the Study Plan get sanctions such as the inability to input the Study Plan into Academic Information System (SIA).
- 2) Students who exceed the standard study load are subject to sanctions, resulting in the cancellation of specific courses until they adhere to the credit load limit in accordance with established regulations.
- 3) Students who fail to meet college attendance requirements will get sanctions, including being ineligible to take exams for the relevant subjects.
- 4) Students found guilty of cheating during the exam receive sanctions, including a warning, nullification of the exam paper, and an E grade for the course.
- 5) Students found guilty of perjury receive sanctions, including an E grade for the course and academic probation for at least one semester, during which they must continue paying Single Tuition Fees.
- 6) Students who commit plagiarism in their papers will receive sanctions, including cancellation of their work, requiring them to rewrite the paper or thesis.
- 7) Students who do not meet the requirements for the fourth-stage evaluation in their first semester receive sanctions, including academic probation.
- 8) Students who extend their studies beyond the prescribed limit of 5 years receive sanctions in the form of three warning letters from the Dean. If, despite these warnings, the student fails to complete their studies, they may be asked to resign.

### A. Graduate Learning Outcomes

- b. Uphold humanity while carrying out responsibilities in accordance with religion, morality, and ethics;
- c. Contribute to enhancing the quality of life in society, the nation, and the state, fostering civilization based on Pancasila;
- d. Embrace a sense of national pride and love for the country, demonstrating strong nationalism and responsibility towards the state and nation;
- e. Show respect for cultural, ideological, religious, and belief diversity, as well as the original opinions and discoveries of others;
- f. Collaborate with others and possess social sensitivity and concern for both society and the environment;
- g. Abide by the law and exhibit discipline in societal and state life;
- h. Internalize academic values, norms, and ethics;
